Fund Manager Comment

Market review

Equity markets remained under pressure during September as rising risk aversion continued to weigh on stocks, the FTSE World Index falling 5.9% in Sterling (GBP) terms. Consternation over global economic growth once again dominated proceedings, with sentiment further shaken by the FOMC announcement that it would 'just' extend the duration of the Federal Reserve's balance sheet, rather than embark on a third round of quantitative easing. While this succeeded in lowering the long-term interest rates (ten-year US Treasury yields falling to a record low of 1.7%), equity markets fell sharply as hopes for greater intervention proved wide of the mark. This dynamic was also apparent in Europe where political gridlock meant the sovereign debt issue, and the apparent under-funding of European banks in the event of a Greek default, remained largely unresolved. As a result, investors have been forced to consider the potential for and ramifications of another Lehman-style crisis, which has naturally led to soaring risk aversion (the VIX Index - a measure of implied volatility – making post 2008 highs) and paring of equity exposure, with some evidence of indiscriminate selling evidenced by extreme levels of cross-correlation.

Technology review

The technology sector significantly outperformed the broader market during the month, aided by a resurgent US dollar which materially ameliorated negative returns, the Dow Jones World Technology Index falling just 0.7% in GBP terms. Despite headlines to the contrary, technology fundamentals have so far remained relatively robust beyond specific sub-sectors such as semiconductors. With three of the team having recently returned from trips to the US, Japan and Taiwan, it appears that third quarter earnings season may not be the disaster many are expecting. Indeed, encouraging recent off-quarter results and guidance from the likes of Oracle, Red Hat, Adobe, TIBCO, Verifone and Accenture, have largely confirmed this view. While there have been some disappointing pre-announcements from Netflix, Research in Motion and Best Buy, thus far these appear stock specific. The 'action' of semiconductor stocks, which have fallen sharply since April (reflecting inventory depletion and softening end demand), has also been encouraging as the vast majority of negative pre-announcements appear to have been widely anticipated by investors. Furthermore, additional M&A activity has acted as a timely reminder of how attractive valuations have become should a worst-case outcome be averted. Indeed, the Trust benefitted during the month from the acquisition of Netlogic Microsystems by Broadcom for a 50% premium, which was in line with upside delivered by other recent transactions such as the acquisitions of Autonomy (by Hewlett Packard) and Motorola Mobility (by Google). We are confident that M&A activity at elevated premiums will continue, particularly should stocks remain at depressed levels.

Outlook

While cognizant of the existential nature of the "top-down" risks that exist today, we believe they are well understood and that our interests as equity investors remain aligned with those of policymakers. Of course, it may take a near-term worsening of the current crisis to catalyse European politicians, but their timeline is shortening and as such we expect further clarity in the near-term regarding a Greek 'solution' and a potential recapitalisation of selected European banks. In addition, we believe the recent tone change from Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke was significant as it suggests that the so-called "Fed Put" may return, should the backdrop deteriorate much further. We would also not underestimate the willingness of the Chinese to provide further stimulus in order to avoid a hard landing. As such - and with many investors seemingly preparing for the worst - we remain optimistic, a position buttressed by a number of indicators (such as investor sentiment, volatility and breadth measures) which are all at supportive, if not extreme, levels. As such, we have used the pronounced weakness in small and mid-cap stocks to increase our exposure to them at the expense of selected large-caps that have proven exceptionally defensive to date. This measured rotation is entirely consistent with our long held belief that a new technology cycle is firmly underway, which should disproportionately favour next-generation companies unencumbered by legacy exposures. With many of our favoured stocks apparently already pricing in negative growth next year, we have been enthusiastically topping up positions given our view that most should still be able to grow in 2012, albeit at a slower pace given the more challenging macroeconomic backdrop.

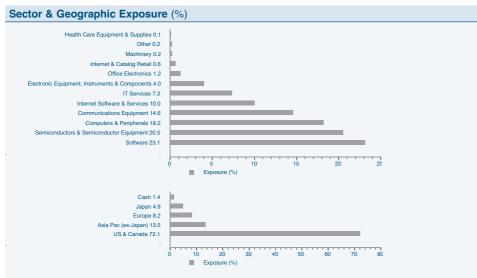
