## Fund Manager Comment

### Market review

The FTSE World Index fell 2.9% in sterling terms during June as investors' risk appetite diminished following the release of Federal Reserve (Fed) minutes on the 22 May which revealed that "a number of participants" on the FOMC favoured slowing QE as early as the summer. While Chairman Bernanke subsequently attempted to shore up sentiment by making it clear that this decision would remain data dependent (a position reiterated at the June Fed meeting), risk appetite shifted decisively, evidenced by ten year US Treasury yields that continued to rise sharply, ending the month at 2.48% – breaking out of a range that had held for almost two years. Assets that had been among the biggest 'beneficiaries' of QE3 – gold, bonds and emerging market equities – suffered greatest, as positions were unwound in a somewhat disorderly fashion. Economic data in the US was broadly positive, while Japanese Q1 GDP came in well ahead of expectations driven by export orders. Unfortunately, these positives were overshadowed by developments in China where weaker than expected current economic trends were magnified by efforts to rein in the shadow banking system, China's new leadership using their "honeymoon period" to tackle some of the recent excess.

### Technology performance

Having rebounded sharply in May (regaining half of its year-to-date underperformance) the technology sector trailed during June, the Dow Jones World Tech Index falling 4.3%. Overall sector malaise was largely due to smartphone related newsflow, as demand for Samsung's Galaxy S4 appeared lacklustre, weighing heavily on the stock (which had hitherto escaped the smartphone downdraft). Likewise smartphone-related 'gravity' caught up with ARM following news that Intel had captured a tablet socket at Samsung. Apple continued on its downward path following an uneventful WWDC where the company unveiled its new operating system (iOS7) but nothing that might drive an upgrade cycle necessary to turn around its revenue trajectory. Blackberry didn't help matters by significantly missing unit expectations for its flagship BB10 device. M&A activity also returned to the fore with rich deals being announced by corporate and private equity buyers alike as Salesforce.com announced the acquisition of ExactTarget (a small PCT position), Google acquired private social mapping vendor Waze and Thomas Bravo picked up Keynote Systems. Renewed M&A activity, together with further evidence of new cycle impairment at Oracle (disappointing results and guidance for the second quarter in a row) added to the allure of small-caps which outperformed their larger peers during the period.

### Outlook

We believe the current market correction is likely (in time) to prove little more than a short-term setback within a new secular bull market. While this assessment might appear overly sanguine (particularly if you have been on the receiving end of this QE-related unwind of consensus longs) we do not believe that the Fed (and other policymakers) can risk disengagement before developed economies have achieved so-called 'escape velocity'. While the FOMC minutes support the idea that the timeline for 'tapering' has been advanced, this largely reflects the Fed's more upbeat assessment of the US economy. Although nothing has really changed – QE had to 'end' at some point, and its timing was always going to be 'data dependent' – risk associated with a number of consensus positions has changed. Falling inflation expectations (justified or otherwise) have hammered gold and other reflation trades while rising yields and/or 'failed' bond auctions have seen previously 'hot' markets such as Thailand, Indonesia and Japan move firmly into bear market territory. Outflows from these crowded trades have been significant, investors withdrawing more than US\$30 billion from US bond mutual funds in the first three weeks of June alone.

While the current correction could yet extend, equities, rather than bonds, are likely to be the greatest beneficiaries of a more reasoned assessment of the timing and form of Fed disengagement. As such we have used the current correction to reduce our liquidity, although this is likely to be a gradual process given the US correction has been modest thus far and investor sentiment remains far from despondent. We are also mindful of increased risk to the China growth story, the new leadership proving far less market friendly than we had hoped. Given the Fed's 'data dependency' we are hopeful that the rotation towards cyclicals and beta will hold, while the pullback in Japan looks very buyable given that Prime Minister Abe and the BoJ appear unable to change course, having burned their ships a la Cortés.

As for technology, the sector is likely to remain a beneficiary of the QE unwind as a relative safe haven given its limited EM exposure and massive net cash position (which might finally earn something should rates continue to rise). Although off-quarter reports from Adobe, Micron and Red Hat were better than expected, Q2 is unlikely to prove a rallying cry for the overall sector given that the new cycle has become increasingly pernicious, evidenced by another poor quarter from Oracle and a surprisingly weak recent report from Accenture. The combination of modest IT spending growth (forecast at 2-3% this year) and the Cloud increasingly becoming the default option is likely to take its toll on incumbents who are likely to more fully feel the impact of new cycle deflation. This dynamic had recently been overwhelmed by generalist investors who bid up legacy assets, particularly those committed to returning more of their excess cash to shareholders. While laudable, we continue to believe these shareholder friendly efforts are a side-show to the real story unfolding within our sector – that the focus of computing has shifted forever from the enterprise to the cloud.





### Investment Rationale
